Reading Strategy—MAKE CONNECTIONS Some Suggestions



<u>Goal</u>: To encourage students to draw upon prior knowledge to make connections between the text of a reading and themselves, other readings and the world in order to clarify and extend understanding.

Making Connections...

- 1. Guides students to understand that what they already know helps them to learn;
- 2. Allows for meaningful conversations about a content topic even before students begin reading;
- 3. Helps students see knowledge as cumulative and integrated;
- 4. Supports students in creating prior knowledge necessary for future success.
- 5. It is IMPORTANT...
 - o To model the skill, e.g. through a Think-Aloud activity;
 - To keep student focus relevant to selected content;
 - o To encourage students to make a variety of connections, not just to themselves;
 - o To use graphic organizers (when possible) to help students visualize connections;
 - To use follow-up questions so students think about how the connection has influenced their understanding (e.g. Exit Questions);
 - To encourage students to learn from others' connections.
